Christianity as a Global World Faith



A brand-new resource that aims to work together with Understanding Christianity to challenge the Eurocentric vision of Christianity and celebrate the infinite translatability we can find in the diversity that exists within the Christian Faith.

Those who have trialled the scheme, both in primary and in secondary shared their delight at the impact on their pupils, the depth of their understanding as well as their increased capacity for courageous advocacy.

This inclusive resource is rooted in **ubuntu**.

Ubuntu is an Nguni Bantu term that is usually translated as 'A person is a person through other people' or 'I am because we are.' In this worldview we can only understand who we are in relationship with other people; only achieve our full potential through that 'tender network of interdependence'.

'We don't come fully formed into the world. We learn how to think, how to walk, how to speak, how to behave, indeed how to be human from other human beings. We need other human beings in order to be human. We are made for togetherness... to exist in a tender network of interdependence. That is how you have ubuntu – you care, you are hospitable, you're gentle, you're compassionate and concerned.'
Desmond Tutu as quoted in *Battle* 1997:35



Paul Fidler, RE Subject lead at Tanworth-in-Arden CoE Primary school, shared that the resource offered a wide range of videos, stories and suggested activities with common threads, but different perceptions because of the different worldviews encountered.

Gemma Hathaway, Assistant Headteacher at Blue Coat Church of England School and Music College, who used the resource with KS3 and KS5 students noticed their high-level conversations about specific concepts found in sacred texts. She went on to explain that the multidisciplinary approach of the tasks provided led her students to explore the diverse ways people worship or interpret scripture through their different worldviews and experiences.

It is very pertinent to find resources such as this when the latest National Director's SIAMS Annual Report names "Christianity as a global faith" as the most cited development point in this year's inspection reports.

Full of authentic case studies from all around the world, these resources will be free to access after a proper training has been completed by the school (at a small fee). The team is finalising the logistics of the training delivery (including its timing, cost and integration with wider approaches to RE training). We look forward to sharing the details with you as soon as they are available.

Our Nativity Project is a series of workshops best taught over six days. We can work with either one or multiple class groups. Alternatively, one-off workshops can be arranged to explore key parts of the story through theatre and dance.

Scenes could include:

- An angel visits Mary
- Mary and Joseph travel to Bethlehem
- Mary and Joseph arrive in Bethlehem, are turned away and then finally welcomed
- The kings follow the star
- The kings arrive at Herod's palace
- Angels appear to the Shepherds
- The kings present gifts and celebrate Jesus' birth
- The new family dream of danger
- Escape to Egypt
- Jesus and his family as refugees receive welcome and refuge

The fee for a full day of workshops is £450 plus travel expenses.

The Springs Easter Project leads pupils through a series of dance workshops that help them engage with the Easter story.

Children will learn and create movement in response to the story. There is opportunity for spiritual development and the children will use their imaginations and creativity, growing empathy, self knowledge, self-esteem and self-confidence.

The workshops can culminate in an informal sharing or performance of the Easter story by the pupils, which can be shown to the school and parents through either a live or filmed presentation.

The project can be adapted to suit the school.

During the summer, we embarked on a week of child-centred, creative endeavour rooted in the Hayfield Cross School Vision and Values: **Joy, Fellowship** and **Integrity**. The children were encouraged to "**Be Brave**" and explore artistic genres and musical activities, leading to a whole-school exhibition for families and the wider community. This was an exciting opportunity to see our children producing meaningful and inspiring work of which they were proud and a chance to enable all members of our community to think deeply about our Vision and Values.

OUR VISIT TO PETERBOROUGH CATHEDRAL

When we arrived at the Cathedral, we were met by Toni and she told us that before we started our activities we would enjoy looking at the beautiful building.

I can't believe how BIG it is! It is so big, and so beautiful!

We have visited our local church many times and have enjoyed looking for signs and symbols. We enjoyed finding things on the Cathedral building that we had seen in St Peter's Church, Stanion- such as crosses, and the crossed keys of St Peter.

We also had the opportunity to look around the inside of Cathedral and to learn more about this amazing building. The children were definitely filled with a sense of 'awe and wonder'.

The children were encouraged to touch things, look at things and to ask questions. We all really enjoyed looking at details in the stained glass, and Toni shared her knowledge so effectively with the children.



The focus of our session was the Genesis 1 Creation story, which linked to the work we are currently doing in school as part of our RE in EYFS. The interactive approach to telling the story was so effective, and engaged our Reception children throughout. Toni had prepared a whole range of items to re-tell the story, involving every child actively within the re-telling.

I loved looking at the windows. Toni showed us how to find Jesus in the windows. The windows are very beautiful.



Although the children were familiar with the story, this interactive story telling experience really embedded and deepened their understanding.

Mrs Hankins commented on the inspirational approach to story-telling, which added such depth to the story of the Creation. We will definitely do this again in school!

The children really enjoyed this activity, and their responses included:

I loved it when we could all use loud voices to shout out IT IS GOOD after every part of the story.

I really loved making the story of the Creation. It was fun for all of us and we all had a part. I was lucky because I got to do my favourite part with the animals on the land.

We responded further to the Creation Story by making our own images of different parts of the story. The children upcycled CDs to create their own pictures, which are now on display in our classroom. We have also created more 'CD' pictures on returning to school, as the children loved this activity so much!

Part of our work in the classroom has been linked to recycling and upcycling and looking at ways that we can care for our wonderful world. Upcycling CDs linked so well to this classroom work, and all of our 'wonderful world' pictures are now proudly displayed in the classroom.

We also learnt more about the importance of music within church buildings in general. And everyone enjoyed identifying instruments from pieces of music. Everyone was impressed with the sound of the organ, and we learnt about how the sounds are made. Alex showed us how sound is affected by the length of the pipes. We all agreed that the one instrument that we can all use is our voice, and we sang, 'He's got the whole world in his hands' together. It felt very special to sing in the Cathedral.

As we headed outside, we were all reminded about the importance of noticing and caring for our beautiful world, and to be grateful for it. We certainly felt very

lucky to enjoy the beautiful cathedral garden, and to have the opportunity to collect things to create our own 'sticky stick'.

The children also experienced, with Toni, the different scents of plants and herbs, and they all engaged in every part of this activity with interest, enthusiasm and excitement.

I liked picking the flowers for my sticky stick. It helped me to think of God's wonderful world.

All the plants and flowers are so special. I love the ones that smell, not just the pretty ones.

I loved the sticky stick! It was like a journey stick and we could collect lots of lovely things from God's wonderful world.

The whole day was a real enrichment of our RE curriculum, and will enable us to develop the unit with even more knowledge, understanding and creativity.

We would like to thank Toni, Alex and everyone involved in enabling our young children to have such a memorable experience, and we will look forward to visiting again soon. All of the activities were so well planned, organised and creatively resourced, and we all felt privileged to have this opportunity to work at the Cathedral.

We are now inspired to develop the work further in school, and we have already started a very creative 'Creation' display.

'We are delighted to share with you our updated school visits programme – a range of exciting and engaging activities using the Cathedral as an inspirational resource! Highlights for church schools include:

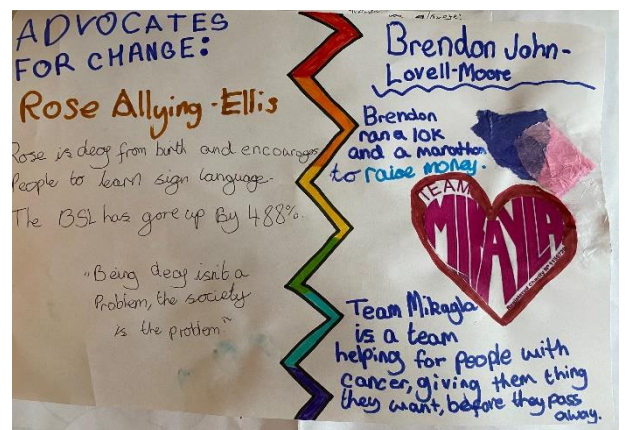
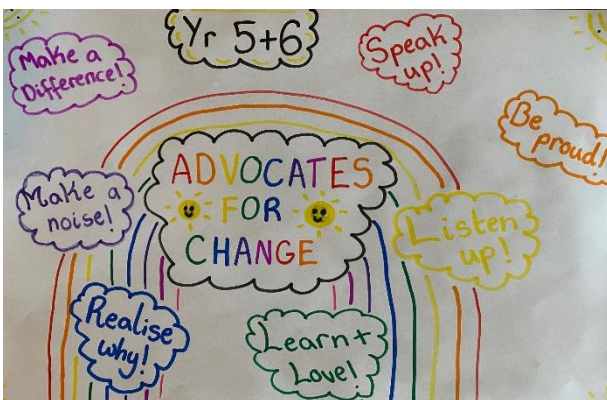

Response to our SIAMs inspection next steps.

Our school's SIAM's inspection was very positive, particularly with regards to our vision. One of the areas of development from the final report was to: 'ensure balance between philosophy, theology and the social sciences in the teaching of religious education (RE). This is to help deepen pupils' understanding of the way thinking and belief influence the way people live'.

We already use 'skills cards' for other subjects across the curriculum such as History (see below) to help introduce the skill being used in that lesson. After careful reflection, we decided to introduce skills cards into R.E in the same way. These will live on the R.E. display board, but be brought forward to the teaching board at the beginning of every applicable lesson. By talking and explaining each skill explicitly, we are hoping that the children will be able to talk about the three strands independently when discussing R.E.
